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#### **FOREWORD**

Those blessed original collaborators have today been joined by a new generation of very capable colleagues in preparing this new text. They build on a solid foundation of faith and now present a worthy successor to that first effort.

While Lead Me, Guide Me was specifically developed with the particular liturgical needs of the African-American Catholic community in mind, it was never envisioned to be used exclusively in those parish communities. That bridge-building was also a welcome benefit of the first edition of Lead Me, Guide Me, and I have every expectation that the entire Catholic community will welcome this new edition and find it a bridge from which the entire Church might glimpse the beauty and the spiritual depth of the soul of the people who composed and continue to cherish these songs of faith.

#### **PREFACE**

It all began on December 11, 2002, when the advisory committee gathered in Chicago under the leadership of Archbishop Wilton D. Gregory. It was an inspiring all-day session that identified the need for, and set the direction of, the revision of *Lead Me*, *Guide Me*: *The African American Catholic Hymnal* (1987).

The core committee was assembled, and soon the work began. This committee met for twoand three-day work sessions spread over the next seven years. It is a tribute to the dedication
of the very busy people on the core committee to note that all members were present for every
meeting—no exceptions. As word of the impending revision of the *Roman Missal* became
known, it was clear that the hymnal could not be published until such revisions were in place,
thus stretching the project out for as many years as it has ultimately taken.

Much was learned from the experience of using *Lead Me*, *Guide Me* (1987) in parish worship for twenty years, and all of this experience informed the work of the committee. A comparison of the two editions will make it readily apparent that the second edition is more liturgically complete, broader in scope—both in the sheer number of items included and in the breadth of the materials represented—and more sophisticated in its editing, thus better representing the musical performance practices of the African American church.

Each member of the core committee brought his or her unique gifts to the project: the chairman, Msgr. Raymond P. East, an extraordinary pastoral sense; Rev. J-Glenn Murray, SJ, liturgical scholarship; Sr. Joan Angela Edwards, SSM, a knowledge of the music of Caribbean immigrants; Dr. James Abbington, an academic knowledge of African American church music; Marcia Berry, a lifetime of experience as a parish musician; Richard Cheri, liturgy and music workshop/conference organizer and parish musician; Dr. Norah Duncan IV, twenty-six years as cathedral music director with *Lead Me*, *Guide Me* in the pews; and Kenneth Louis, composer and arranger of music for the Black church, and parish musician.

The committee acknowledges the work done by the committee of the *African American Heritage Hymnal* (GIA 2001) and its music editor, Rev. Nolan E. Williams, Jr. Theirs was the pioneering effort to represent African American musical performance practices on the printed page.
